



Listen, Respect, Care for & Love your Elders.


Each one of here at UBC have Elders in our lives and it is our duty to honor them by doing our best in all that we do. Our hard work here, includes their wishes/prayers for our success.



## My guide, as with so many First Peoples on Turtle Island...



They are in this slide with THE MAN who loved Chief Mountain.


#### Vancouver, My Health Home


I moved here in 1994 the year after I was diagnosed with HIV+. I came here for several reasons – the health care, the 2spirit community and the sunsets.

Since then I have been on several different ARV's (Anti RetoVirals). They seem to be working because for the last 5 years my CD4 count has been hovering around 500 – 600 and the normal level is around 500 to 1500. And my viral load has been undectable for about the same time.

10 years ago I was diagnosed with HepC after making one wrong decision. I was in the hospital for 2 weeks, then out, then back in with meningitis – knocking on heavens door.

I started HepC treatment – it did not work.





## Day 1 of HepC treatment and a

#### new chapter at UBC

After the first treatment did not work I went a few years without HepC treatment.

Four years ago I started the new treatment available called Harvoni.

I started the Friday before I took these pics. The walk up Grouse Mountain (no not the Grind) was a way of celebrating a new chapter – the day after this I started here at UBC in "Gender Race, Sexuality and Social Justice".

Also on this day I could actually feel something in my blood – wow the drug was working. My body has since been cleared of HepC.

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



## Tradition & Culture


